MILLENNIUM GREEN ACTIVITY SHEET



The Millennium Green was created to renovate a derelict area by the Old Bakehouse in Morpeth. The Countryside agency was given £10 million of Lottery money by the Millennium Commission to fund the transformation of sites up and down the country to mark the year 2000.

Local residents became aware of this initiative and looked into the idea of using the land at Bakehouse Yard to mark the millennium. This was widely approved for its potential to be widely enjoyed by the local community; and so a feasibility study was commissioned which showed the land could be transformed into a 'Millennium Green' for £66,000.

The nearby residents registered with the Charity Commission along with others who were keen to see the land put to better use.

The Old Bakehouse Millennium Green Trust was founded, to acquire the land, apply for grants, oversee all work done, and maintain the green for all to enjoy.

The Countryside Agency provided professional guidance for the trustees and helped in fundraising by offering £33,000 toward the scheme. The rest of the money required was generously donated by the sponsors listed below. Upon completion, the Millennium Green was officially opened by Cllr Frank Harrington on Friday 6th October 2000. Over 100 people attended the opening event.

COLOUR THE MOSAICS



The mosaic project was funded by Awards for All. Children from Stobhillgate First School and King Edward VI High School completed six mosaics during 2003, taking the theme of flora and fauna. Pupils at Stobhill First School spent three days learning about mosaics, designing images for inclusion on their two mosaics and practising mosaic techniques by making individual 'card mosaic pictures' before working in small groups with art Student Rob Jamieson, to produce the ladybird and bumble bee mosaics.

Year 10 students from King Edwards VI worked in four groups over several weeks to design and complete their mosaics under the guidance of project designer Christine Jamieson and Art teacher Jack Ramsey. The project was integrated into the G.C.S.E curriculum. During the summer, five of the six mosaics were set onto concrete biscuits donated by EJ Stone. The sixth was set onto wood for wall mounting.
